Preparing Students for the TSI Assessment

College Readiness in Texas in 2015

Although more Texas students are taking exams such as the SAT, fewer students are demonstrating college readiness.

41.9%

Nationally, 41.9% of students graduating in 2015 met the SAT college and career readiness benchmark.

31.8%

In Texas, only 31.8% of graduating students met that benchmark,1 the lowest percentage in two decades.2

33.9%

In 2014, 33.9% met the benchmark.3

The percentage of graduating students meeting the benchmark dropped from 2014 to 2015

The Role of the TSI Assessment in College Readiness

In 2008, Texas became the first state to implement a series of standards to measure college and career readiness.4

From 2008 to 2014, the percentage of collegeready students jumped from 44% to 54%.6

In 2013 the Texas Success Initiative (TSI) assessment was implemented to create a single statewide college-readiness standard.

The Importance of the TSI Assessment

The impact of the TSI Assessment has been far-reaching:

Schools in the Collegiate Academy phase of becoming an Early College per TEA must have a minimum number of students meet the TSI passing standard.

In addition, high school students must be in compliance with the TSI assessment before receiving dual credit in early college/dual credit programs, unless exempt.

Students enrolling at a Texas institution of higher education must take the TSI assessment to demonstrate college readiness, unless exempt.5

Those students who do not pass one or all parts of the TSI assessment must enroll in an appropriate developmental education course before they can enroll in a credit-bearing course for the subjects in which they did not meet state standards.

And the TSI requirements are set to change, as the scores required to demonstrate college readiness will go up in 2017 and again in 2019...

In the fall of 2017 and again in the fall of 2019, students will have to score higher in math and reading in order to be considered college-ready according to the TSI assessment.
